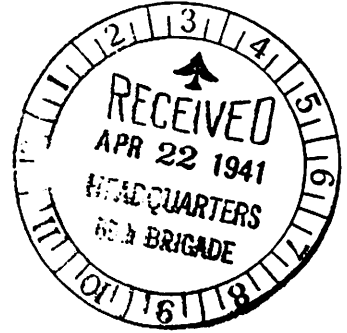

Pursuant to authority contained in letter, Headquarters Seventh Corps Area, Omaha, Nebraska, dated March 20, 1941, subject: "Distribution of Administrative Motor Vehicles", (file AG 457-Motor vehicles (Gen) D x 323.7-Camp Joseph T. 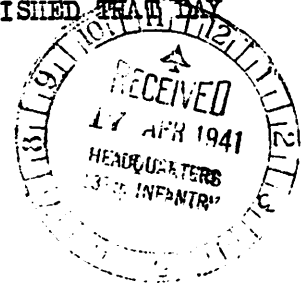

OFFICIAL:

1. a. From an examination of payrolls being submitted for April 1941, it appears evident that certifying officers and perhaps others have not given proper attention to the cautionary instructions heretofore issued and to regulations concerning date of completion of the four months' service necessary for enlisted men in first enlistment to qualify for \$30.00 base pay. Certifying officers are pecuniarily responsible for claims certified by them.

b. Time lost, such as SNLD, AWCL, absence in hands of civil authority resulting in conviction, confinement as a result of court martial, or any other time which must normally be made up to complete an enlistment cannot be counted as service. An enlisted man who loses time cannot complete his four months' service in exactly four months from date of enlistment or induction.

c. Officers supervising preparation of payrolls and all certifying officers will check triplicate copies of submitted payrolls, particularly April 1941, to verify correctness of all entries relative to completion of four months' service in order to prevent overpayments.

d. Regimental and Special Unit Commanders will report by letter to the Division Finance Officer that these instructions have been followed.

2. Removal of Heaters or Stoves: No heating stoves or gas heaters are to be tampered with or removed from any tent or building.

3. Signal Requisition: The next Signal Requisition is due noon, May 15. This is for 1st Quarter, FY 1942.

a. Supply Officers supplying organizations other than their own, will submit a separate requisition for this unit, i.e. Infantry Regiments supplying Brigade Hq Companies and Artillery Bns supplying Artillery Regiments, etc.

- b. 1. The column STOCK NO will NOT be filled in unless the correct STOCK NO is known.
2. The column ARTICLE will agree with the Signal Storage Catalogue.
3. The column UNIT will agree with the Signal Storage Catalogue.
4. The column ON HAND & DUE will have only the amount ON HAND shown. The Supply Officer will certify that this column is correct.
5. The column CONSUMED will be the amounts used up, I & I'd, surveyed, etc.
6. The column REQUIRED will in no case exceed the amounts authorized in TBA's.

c. Failure to comply with the above will result in returning of the requisition and probable non receipt of the property.

4. a. Under provision of AR 210-55, the regular monthly inventory will be taken of all stock and fixtures belonging to the 35th Division Camp Exchange as of the close of business April 24, 1941, and all of the 35th Division Camp Exchanges will remain closed on that day.

OFFICIAL:

1. Regimental and similar unit Fire Marshals will meet Thursday, 24 April 1941, 1:30 PM at Lloyd England Hall. All above units MUST be represented.
2. Adjutants of all regiments and separate units will report to the Division Chemical Officer by noon Saturday the following information concerning personnel of their unit who are graduates of the Chemical Warfare School, Edgewood Arsenal: Grade, name, serial number, present assignment, year of graduation. Negative reports will be made where necessary.
3. Last sentence of paragraph 75b, FM 27-15, 6 Feb 41, "Military Law - Domestic Disturbances", is in error. Training masks issued in this Division will protect against irritant gases (DM - Adamsite) that might be used for riot control.
4. a. Keeping a gas mask within reach should become habitual with all personnel of this command. Most men can hold their breath about 30 seconds. Masks should be carried, or be in position where they can be reached in that time.
b. It has been noted that personnel become exhausted easily when wearing masks. This is due to the abnormal breathing required and lack of development of diaphragm and chest muscles. All personnel should be able to perform all of their normal duties while wearing masks. Therefore, masks should be worn during short periods while various duties are being performed; the length of periods being increased day by day.
5. a. Unit commanders are responsible that individuals leaving Camp Robinson are wearing presentable correct uniforms; that they are clean and neat in appearance; have their hair cut; and have sufficient funds to reasonably insure that they will be able to return to the reservation at their own expense.

b. Leggins will not be worn with trousers while on pass or furlough, nor will any unauthorized items of uniform be worn.

c. Under no circumstances will any mixture of civilian and uniform clothing be worn.

d. At all times and places the uniform will be properly worn.

e. Violations of the above provisions which reflect upon the Army will subject the individual responsible to apprehension by the Military Police and disciplinary measures.

6. ORDNANCE: It is requested that shipping tickots be made at time of shipment, or as soon thereafter as possible. Reference AR 35-6560, paragraph 3-b.

Several shipments of Ordnance property have been made to "Ordnance Property Officer, Camp Joseph T. Robinson, Arkansas", and to date no shipping tickots received.

Attention is invited to the fact that in order to clear the property accounts of the Supply Officers it is necessary for them to have signed vouchers for credits to their accounts.

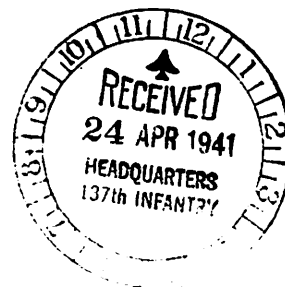

3. Ammunition boxes or containers, or similar boxes made of scrap lumber, will be obtained by the commanders of troops and be filled with gravel to simulate in volume and weight as nearly as possible one-third unit of fire, to be carried in prime movers and unit ammunition trains. For ammunition not normally packed in boxes, small arms ammunition boxes or improvised boxes will be used to represent the load. These loads will be transported in the proper vehicles to the maneuver area.

SECTION II

4. Schedule of Exercises.

C-1. Morning and afternoon of June 2. CPX prepared and conducted by Commanding General, VII Army Corps. Headquarters of units, to include battalions, and necessary detachment of headquarters companies will participate. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, VII Army Corps.

C-2. Morning and afternoon of June 3, night of June 3-4, morning and afternoon of June 4. A field exercise, prepared and conducted by Commanding General, VII Army Corps. Enemy imaginary. All troops of the corps will participate. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, VII Army Corps.

C-3. Morning and afternoon of June 5, night of June 5-6, morning and afternoon of June 6. A field exercise prepared and conducted by Commanding General, VII Army Corps. Enemy imaginary. All troops of the corps will participate. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, VII Army Corps.

C-4. Morning and afternoon of June 7, night of June 7-8. CPX prepared and conducted by Commanding General, VII Army Corps. Headquarters of units, to include battalions, and necessary detachments of headquarters companies will participate. Preparatory to C-5. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, VII Army Corps.

C-5. Morning and afternoon of June 9, night of June 9-10, morning and afternoon of June 10. A field exercise prepared and conducted by Commanding General, VII Army Corps. All troops of the corps will participate. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, VII Army Corps.

C-6. Morning and afternoon of June 12, night of June 12-13, morning and afternoon of June 13. A field maneuver prepared and conducted by Commanding General, VII Army Corps. All troops of the corps will participate. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, VII Army Corps.

JUNE 14. Non-tactical movement to areas for beginning of C-7.

C-7. Morning and afternoon of June 16, night of June 16-17, morning and afternoon of June 17, night of June 17-18. A field maneuver prepared and conducted by the Commanding General, Second Army. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, Second Army.

JUNE 18. Non-tactical march to areas for beginning of C-8.

C-8. Morning and afternoon of June 19, night of June 19-20, morning and afternoon of June 20, night of June 20-21. A field maneuver prepared and conducted by the Commanding General, Second Army. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, Second Army.

JUNE 21. Non-tactical march to areas for beginning of C-9.

C-9. Morning and afternoon of June 23, night of June 23-24, morning and afternoon of June 24, night of June 24-25. A field maneuver prepared and conducted by the Commanding General, Second Army. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, Second Army.

JUNE 25. Non-tactical march to positions for opening of C-10.

C-10. Morning and afternoon of June 26, night of June 26-27, morning and afternoon of June 27, until completion. A field maneuver prepared and conducted by the Commanding General, Second Army. Umpiring and critique by Commanding General, Second Army.

SECTION III

ADMINISTRATION

5. The forward echelon, Second Army Headquarters, will be established at Manchester, Tennessee. Date of opening will be announced. The rear echelon will remain at Memphis, Tennessee. Airplane messenger service will be established between Memphis and Manchester.

6. Troops will depart for their home stations on completion of maneuvers. Present plan is for the 4th Cavalry (H-Mecz) to proceed to Camp Robinson, Little Rock, Arkansas, on termination June training and remain there until beginning of August exercises.

7. The Army Depot will be established at Murfreesboro, Tennessee. It will commence functioning 24 May, 1941. Troops arriving in training area prior to that time will be based on Camp Forrest, Tennessee.

8. At the proper time, Second Army will issue directive letters for execution of road movements to the training area and providing the necessary funds for execution of these movements. These directives will prescribe destination, date of arrival thereat, and maximum time permissible for movement. They will permit each independent commander to select his dates of departure, routes, bivouacs, etc. Movement commanders will adhere to War Department Training Circular #11, March 1, 1941. Instructions for rail movements will issue at the same time unless otherwise directed by War Department.

9. The Ordnance Maintenance Companies (less detachments) in the 27th and 30th Divisions will be withdrawn from the divisions and will be employed as corps troops. If and when any one of the infantry divisions is detached from the Army Corps to operate independently, one of the Corps Maintenance Companies will be detached for service with such division. The Division Ordnance Section will be formed by detaching from Ordnance Maintenance Company sufficient personnel to provide a Division Ordnance Section as authorized for a Triangular Division.

10. Maps to be provided by Second Army for the exercises and maneuvers of the June corps training period will consist of:

a. Automobile road maps, such as are distributed by the commercial service stations, for use as the general map.

b. War Department strategic map, scale 1/500,000, Chattanooga sheet.

c. Special maneuver map and message blank, scale 1/500,000, for umpires, armored force and higher headquarters.

d. Special maneuver map, planimetric, scale 1/63,300 (approx.) with 5,000 yard grid, Zone C (in nine sheets).

e. Photomaps, uncontrolled, scale 1/20,000 with 1,000 yard grid, Zone C (in six sheets).

f. Subordinate units may prepare, produce, reproduce and distribute such maps, air photos, sketches and overlays as may be required by the situation and as can be accomplished by them by the use of equipment

issued or authorized for such units in field service.

11. Preparation of plans and execution of going movement will conform to the following:

a. Supply: By division and by separate unit to midnight of day following date of arrival of each element at destination; by Army thereafter.

(1) Budget items will be brought from home stations for the entire training period.

(2) Sufficient oil and grease will be carried to suffice for entire training period.

(3) Five gallon gasoline cans, with tubes, flexible, with nozzles, will be brought on basis of 2 per motor vehicle (except M/C).

(4) Complete stockage motor vehicles spare parts will be accomplished before departure.

b. Equipment: As prescribed in column 2 (Mobilization) Tables of Basic Allowances, with the following modifications:

(1) Ammunition: None

(2) Comforters: None

(3) One fly, tent, wall, small per authorized tent, wall, small.

(4) Identifications and Control Flags as prescribed by paragraphs 8 and 9 of Umpire Manual, GHQ, War Department, and paragraph 3 of Training Directive No. 8, this Headquarters, will be provided and brought to the training area by all units concerned for their own use.

c. Clothing: As prescribed in Column 2 (Mobilization) Tables of Basic Allowances, with following modifications:

(1) Uniform will be cotton; if not issued, a like number of woolen articles will be substituted.

(2) Woolen outer garments will not be taken, with the exception mentioned in 11 c (1) above.

(3) Shoes, service, two (2) pairs per EM. 3 pairs will be brought if contemplated WD authorization is secured for issue.

d. Transportation:

(1) Commercial transportation is not authorized except for Class I supplies, track-laying vehicles, and for certain units to be designated for which motor transportation is not available and shuttling not practicable.

(2) Rail movements will be executed by the Commanding General of the Corps Area in which the troops are stationed upon request of Commanding General, Second Army. Data for rail transportation will be submitted to the Commanding General, Second Army, immediately upon receipt of movement order.

(3) Due to limited road net, nature of exercises, and probability of very restricted use in training area, authorization by division and separate unit commanders for private vehicles to accompany troops will be curtailed.

e. Personnel:

(1) Garrison prisoners will accompany their units if confinement expires before July 15, 1941.

(2) Arrangements will be made with station commanders for protection of property not taken to the training area, to the end that caretaking detachments may not be left at home stations.

f. Advance Detachments:

(1) Enroute: As commander may direct.

(2) In training area: Advance reconnaissance not authorized.
